## BRISTOW FLEET GETS BIG SIKORSKY S-61Ns

### FOR MALAYSIA CONTRACT

BRISTOW HELICOPTERS recently announced the purchase of two Sikorsky S-6IN (Mark II) helicopters at a cost of £1·3 million, with spares. The Sikorskys, the largest passenger-carrying civil helicopters in the western world, are being transported from the USA to Malaysia where they will undertake off-shore oil exploration support work under contract to Esso Exploration Inc.

At the end of February, the new helicopters will replace Gnome Whirlwinds at Bristow's Kuala Trengganu base 200 miles north east of Kuala Lumpur. They will service oil rigs positioned up to 170 miles out to sea and are capable of carrying up to 26 passengers compared with the Gnome Whirlwind's capacity of 10 passengers.

The Sikorsky S-6lN is the biggest helicopter to be acquired by Bristows. Delivery of the two machines brings the Bristow fleet total to 125 helicopters 13 of which are stationed in South East Asia (Malaysia and Indonesia) on oil exploration work. Bristow, the largest international helicopter group, is undertaking contracts in 17 countries throughout the world.

# BRISTOW CAPTAIN IS PILOT OF THE YEAR

CAPTAIN P. P. SMITH, a pilot with Bristow Helicopters has been named 'Pilot of the Year' by the Helicopter Association of America to mark the part he played in rescuing 19 men from a sinking North Sea drilling rig. He was presented with the award in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Captain Smith and a crew of three, flying in a Rolls Royce-powered Westland Wessex 60 helicopter from Bristow's base near Great Yarmouth, Norfolk, made two flights to the drilling rig Constellation which was being hit by gale force winds in the North Sea last November. Shortly after 19 men were taken off the rig capsized and sank. During the flights which lasted more than seven hours Captain Smith faced a snow storm. The rig was also being hit by mountainous seas. With Captain Smith were his co-pilot Captain John Hall and crewmen Dick Drake and Tony Marshall.

This is the first time that the 'Pilot of the Year' award has been given to a British pilot.
